## Hitachinaka City Sightseeing Guide



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
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Nemophila Hitachi Seaside Park (Spring)

#### Welcome to Hitachinaka City.

Hitachinaka is located near the Tokyo metropolitan, within approximately 110 kilometers of the city and northeast of the center of Ibaraki Prefecture. It is situated on the great Pacific Ocean. Hitachinaka City is blessed with a traditional history and magnificent nature around the area, as well as incredible seafood. The town combines the flavor of bygone days with a modern atmosphere.



#### Hitachi Seaside Park

Stretching across a vast area of approximately 350 hectares, the park features numerous attractions including a large ferris wheel and fresh flowers of the four seasons. The park's Miharashi-no-oka area is flush with sweet blue nemophila in the spring, and lovely rounded kokia in the fall. In the season of the changing leaves, the place is on fire as the kokia transforms from green to red. The scene of platinum blue nemophi-

la and the striking red kokia is truly a sight to behold. [605-4 Mawatari]

#### Mawatari Haniwa Park

The Haniwaseisaku Ruins, an area where the haniwa clay figures were made over the period of the 5th (475-500 BCE) and 6th (575-600 BCE) centuries, has in modern times been rendered into a park. Purple and white irises come into bloom in the area around mid-June every year, drawing many visitors to the park. [2881-3 Mawatari]

# Oceanside



#### Ajigaura Ocean Swimming Beach

This swimming beach, stretching some 1.5 kilometers, draws many visitors to enjoy its waters. Hitachi Seaside Park and large shopping and restaurant areas are also located in this major sightseeing area.

#### A Hiraiso Swimming Beach

Since the surrounding embankments protect the area from high waves, this place is ideal for families. An orange slide in the shape of a whale is very popular with the kids. Rocky fishing areas offer a chance for kids to play with the various marine life of the area including small fishes, crabs, shellfish, and more.

#### 🚴 Uba-no-Futokoro Marine Pool

This saltwater pool powered by the tides is unusual even in Japan. Because the water is pulled into the pool by natural means, you can see small fish in the pools as well.

#### **Beachcombers' Paradise**

The rocky beaches stretching from the Hiraso to Isozaki coasts are great fun for beachcombers from April to October. Visitors can find crabs, hermit crabs, small fish, and more.



### History

#### Ancient

The coastline from Hiraiso-cho to Isozaki-cho is dotted with deposits dating back to the Mesozoic Latter Cretaceous period approximately 75 million years ago. Look into the layers and you'll find fossils of ammonite, pterosaur shoulder bones, and more. There are also many historic sites in the city where visitors can get a taste of the history of the place including colored wall murals, *haniwa* production ground ruins, and more from the Kofun Period.



#### Torazuka Tomb

This large keyhole-

shaped tomb mound, dating to the first half of the seventh century (roughly 600 CE), measures a total of 56.5 meters in length. A series of well-preserved coloring murals were found in the stone chamber in 1973 excavations. [3494-1 Nakane]



#### Hitachinaka Buried Cultural Property Research Center

This facility houses research on buried cultural property in the city as well as related documents. [3499 Nakane]

#### Hiraiso Cretaceous Period Layers (Mesozoic Era Cretaceous Period)

Geological layers of rock ledges all facing the northeast direction dot the section of beach stretching the Hiraiso-cho to Isozaki-cho areas of the city. Discoveries of ammonite fossils in the layers identify them as dating from the Mesozoic Era Cretaceous Period.



#### Jugoroana Tunnel Tombs

These mass graves were carved into rock during the Kofun to Nara Periods (roughly 500-800 CE). The total number of graves is greater than 300, making it one of the largest sites of its kind of the east Japan region. [3490 Nakane]

### The Mito Tokugawa Area

Ibaraki Prefecture, where Hitachinaka City is located, was known as the Mito Domain during the Edo Period (1615-1868). The Nakaminato area of the city in particular has been known for its scenic views since ancient times. It prospered as a shipping hub during the Edo Period, giving rise to numerous wealthy individuals. The area was also an important location for national defense at the end of the Edo Period, hence its numerous historical and scenic spots relating to the Mito branch of the house of Tokugawa.



#### Nakaminato Reverberatory Furnace Ruins

Toward the end of the Edo Period, ships hailing from foreign nations began to appear off the coast of Nakaminato. At the adamant behest of the ninth lord of the Mito Domain, Tokugawa Nariaki — who insisted it was necessary for the defense of the country — a large ballistics foundry operated by the Mito Domain was built in 1857.

The furnaces were destroyed in the rebellion of 1864, but rebuilt in 1937. [1-10 Sakae-cho]



#### Ihinkaku Ruins / Minato Park

These are the ruins of a second house of the Mito Clan, built in 1698 by the order of Tokugawa Mitsukuni, second lord of the Mito Domain. The building was lost in a fire during the rebellion of 1864. The site is now known to the people of the area as Minato Park. This is a very scenic spot offering a view of the Pacific Ocean and Minato-town.

Minato Park is home to black pines that are more than 300 years old. [1-1 Minato-chuo]



#### Sanjo Gate

This gate was established for the purpose of welcoming envoys at the Koishikawa residence of the Mito Domain (Bunkyo Ward, Tokyo). [1-10 Sakae-cho]

### History

The Takeda Clan area of the city is home of the Takeda Clan ancestors of the former Kai Province, known in particular for the famous general Takeda Shingen.

In addition, the area boasts numerous sightseeing spots including shrines and approach roads to the shrines, which are covered in camellia forests to create a mystical atmosphere. There is also the Tenmangu Shrine, where Tokugawa Mitsukuni came to pay his respects, as well as many buildings dating back to the Meiji and Taisho periods. We also recommend that visitors take a leisurely walk in the city, using the Hitachinaka Seaside Railway Minato Line-a local train line of the Hitachinaka area.



#### Takeda Clan Residence

The area in the city dedicated to the Takeda Clan represents the origins of the clan hailing from the former Kai Province. The Residence, erected to commemorate this fact, is built in the Shudenzukuri style of local samurai lords during the Kamakura Period

(1192-1333). [566-2 Takeda]



#### Sakatsuraisosaki Shrine

Legend has it that the god worshipped at this shrine appeared at the seaside of Oaraiisosaki in December 856, leading to the establishment of shrines at Oarai and Saktsuraisosaki.

The 300-meter approach to the shrine, decorated with evergreen groves, is a prefectural-designated natural treasure known for its highly artistic flavor and as an energetically powerful spot.

### Festivals <sup>and</sup> Events



#### Hitachinaka Festival (mid-August)

This very lively festival, specially created by the local people, features a variety of events including floats, *mikoshi* portable shrines, dances contests, and more.

#### **Fireworks Festivals**

Three fireworks festivals are held in Hitachinaka City every summer. Two of these are held in incredible locations near the ocean.



#### Ajigaura Seaside Fireworks Festival (Second half of July)

This fireworks festival is held on the beaches of Ajigaura. The sound of the waves and the sight of the fireworks are an unbeatable combination.

#### Nakaminato Seaside Fireworks Festival (Early August)

This festival is held at the Nakaminato Fishing Port. Star mines appearing like flowers blooming in the water are a must-see.

#### Hitachinaka Festival Fireworks (Mid August)

These fireworks are held in conjunction with the Hitachinaka Festival. A stunning show, they are launched right from where the spectators are sitting, and are accompanied by music.



#### Tenmangu Shrine Festival (Early August)

Widely known as the Hasshaku Festival, this event commemorates the legend of Tenmangu, who is said to have come out of the ocean, *Hamaori*.



#### Heading to the market for food Nakaminato Fish Market

The Nakaminato Fish Market draws more than one million visitors annually from both inside and outside the prefecture. Fresh fish and shellfish are sold here at reasonable prices. There are also numerous food and drink establishments offering fresh seafood including sushi and seafood-on-rice dishes. You'll be delighted by the seafood you find here, including kaiten-zushi ("go-around" sushi).

#### **Dried Items**

These naturally processed whitefish items are soaked in salt and then sun-dried.



#### Processed Octopus Products

Hitachinaka City is Japan's biggest producer of processed octopus products.



#### **Bite-Sized Abalone**

These farmed abalones are grown smaller than usual to be bite-sized (approximately 7 cm).

#### Anglerfish (November–March)

The anglerfish is a typical winter food of Ibaraki Prefecture available from November through March. It is compared with the blowfish in the saying "anglerfish of the east, blowfish of the west." The anglerfish hotpot, which utilizes all parts of the fish, is a staple hotpot at restaurants as well as *ryokan* and *minshuku* type inns in the city.





#### Nakaminato Yakisoba

Nakaminato yakisoba (fried noodles) are known for their chewy texture, a result of their being prepared in a hand-held bamboo steamer. These noodles have been a favorite with the locals for more than fifty years. We recommend that you try a variety of restaurants—because they're all different! #### **Dried Potatoes**

Slowly sundried sweet potatoes are a traditional healthy food of the region, full of both the technique of traditional craftsmen and the fruit of nature. Hitachinaka City is Japan's largest producer of dried potatoes. In the winter, you can see farmers drying the potatoes on reed screen in their yards. The potatoes are full of vitamins B1 and C, potassium, and more. Since no preservatives are used. they are safe food for everyone from children to adults.





#### Vine Berries (December–April)

On-the-vine strawberries feature a wonderful aroma and gorgeous red color. Our sweetbut-sour strawberries are popular with everyone from small children to the elderly.




The Hitachinaka Seaside Railway Minato Line is a historic train line launched in 1913.

Stretching over a 14.3 kilometers, the diesel cars are some of the country's oldest still in operation.

The wooden Nakaminato Station—built 100 years ago—has been named one of Kanto's "100 best" for its unique flavor. In addition, the station leads to a series of retro views from the train window including massive fields and other pastoral views. Even the signboard of station of the Seaside Hitachinaka Seaside Railway Minato Line are illustrated with local delicacies and characteristics—making it interesting for people to see.
